TSN Update

On the 4 March 2006 members of the TSN met at the Millennium Gloucester Hotel London to appoint a committee to take over the management of the TSN from Disaster Action and the British Red Cross. Several people had volunteered to be on the committee. They were: Robert Brewster, Jackie Weston, Michael Pitt, Allison Arlotte, Steve Gill, Shyam Muhandiramge and Alan Jones.

These individuals had met in January 2006 and put their ideas together to present to those gathered at the Millennium Gloucester Hotel. From the January meeting a questionnaire had been devised for TSN members. The purpose of this questionnaire was to ascertain what kind of group would be born from the TSN. What did the members of the group want? – Please read the review of questionnaires on page 3.

First Elected Committee Meeting

On Saturday 25th March, Robert Brewster (Co-Chair), Richard Luck (Co-Chair), Jean Dogan (Treasurer), Jackie Weston (Secretary), Michael Pitt, Allison & Paul Arlotte, Steve Gill, and Renuka Marley met to discuss the information gathered from the questionnaires and to reflect on the meeting of 4 March 06.

Review of Questionnaires

The majority of those that responded wanted meetings to be arranged by the committee. The purpose of such gatherings would be to aid communication between members and to provide support by simply being together. These meetings needed to be informal and social.

Many wanted a newsletter to be circulated that would keep members updated on events and issues relating to the aftermath of 26.12.04. The majority wanted meetings to be quarterly and for venues to be considered outside of London. Future meeting suggestions included a memorial event in December and a picnic.

Membership of the TSN was reviewed with the overall opinion that membership of the TSN successor group should be survivors of the disaster, bereaved and anyone affected. 76% of the respondents want a permanent memorial to be established in the UK. Ideas for the memorial were varied but many requested the site to be in London and for it to be in a garden or park. Many requested a permanent symbol of awareness such as an awareness ribbon.

Forthcoming Film

We have been contacted by Jane Featherstone, Joint Managing Director of Kudos Film and TV, to inform us that Kudos are producing a film on the first 6 days after the tsunami, to be shown on BBC 2, probably in late November this year.

Filming is currently taking place in Thailand. It will concentrate on events in Phuket and Khao Lak and is based on interviews by Abi Morgan, (the producer) in Thailand last July with locals and foreigners (including Norwegians, Swedish, Germans and Australians), survivors or bereaved, who were helping volunteer organisations or waiting for identification of loved ones.

The film is fictional with professional actors and no live interviews. It will examine and challenge the global response in the days after the wave, as well as offer some insight into the human tragedy that unfolded. Abi recently won a BAFTA for her piece about human trafficking, Sex Traffic, which motivated governments to take serious action about this problem, previously ignored.

The following release has been issued:

Tsunami drama to air on BBC Two

Tim Roth and Sophie Okonedo will star in a BBC TV drama based on the aftermath of the 2004 tsunami disaster, to be broadcast later this year.

The joint project with US network HBO also features Toni Collette, Hugh Bonneville and Chiwetel Ejiofor.

It is written by Abi Morgan, whose credits include Sex Traffic.

"It's a tribute to the power of Abi's writing that such an extraordinary cast has come together," said BBC Two controller Roly Keating.

Filming on location in Phuket and Khao Lak has begun. Production company Kudos is working with local communities and the piece will feature various locations and landmarks affected by the tsunami.

"Through meticulously researching real-life events, real people and working closely with the survivors' groups, Abi has written a wonderful, powerful drama that purposely asks what mankind can learn from the event," said executive producer Jane Featherstone.

Other actors involved include Gina McKee, Kate Ashfield, Samarit MacHielsen and Grirggiat Punpiputt.

UK Memorial Project

After the announcement by Gordon Brown in his March budget that £1million had been allocated for a memorial for victims of the July bombings in London, we wrote to Tessa Jowell (Minister for the Department of Culture, Media and Sport) and Jack Straw (former Foreign Secretary) requesting funding for a memorial for the Asian Tsunami British victims. We understand the D.C.M.S and F.C.O are meeting to discuss this and await the outcome.

Khao Lak Memorial Project

The winner of the competition to design a memorial for the Asian Tsunami at the Khao Lak National Park is to be announced by the Thai government on 22nd May. The following article appeared in the Australian press:

"A shimmering field of hundreds of lights set in shallow ocean water is the centrepiece of a Australian design bid for a tsunami memorial competition that has closed in Thailand."

The proposal, entitled "Lighting the Void", is led by architects Richard Weller and Gary Marinko from the University of Western Australia.

It is among five international finalists. A Thai panel is expected to announced the winner on May 22^{nd} .

The memorial is to be built at the beach resort and national park at Khao Lak in southern Thailand, where thousands died in the Boxing Day 2005 disaster.

"I guess we are guietly confident," Weller said.

The Australian plan includes a museum, as well as a circular field of 540 lights, secured in water just off the beach.

During the day, refracted light from shaped glass in each light would give the "ocean a sparkling quality on the surface," Weller said.

"It's quite a large thing. It's about as big as two football ovals so it has a sublime quality in terms of its scale," he said.

Light was chosen as a theme because it is "a universal sign of hope and optimism".

The Australian entry faces competition from designs from Finland, the United States, Spain, and China. Some include bridge-like structures and towers.
